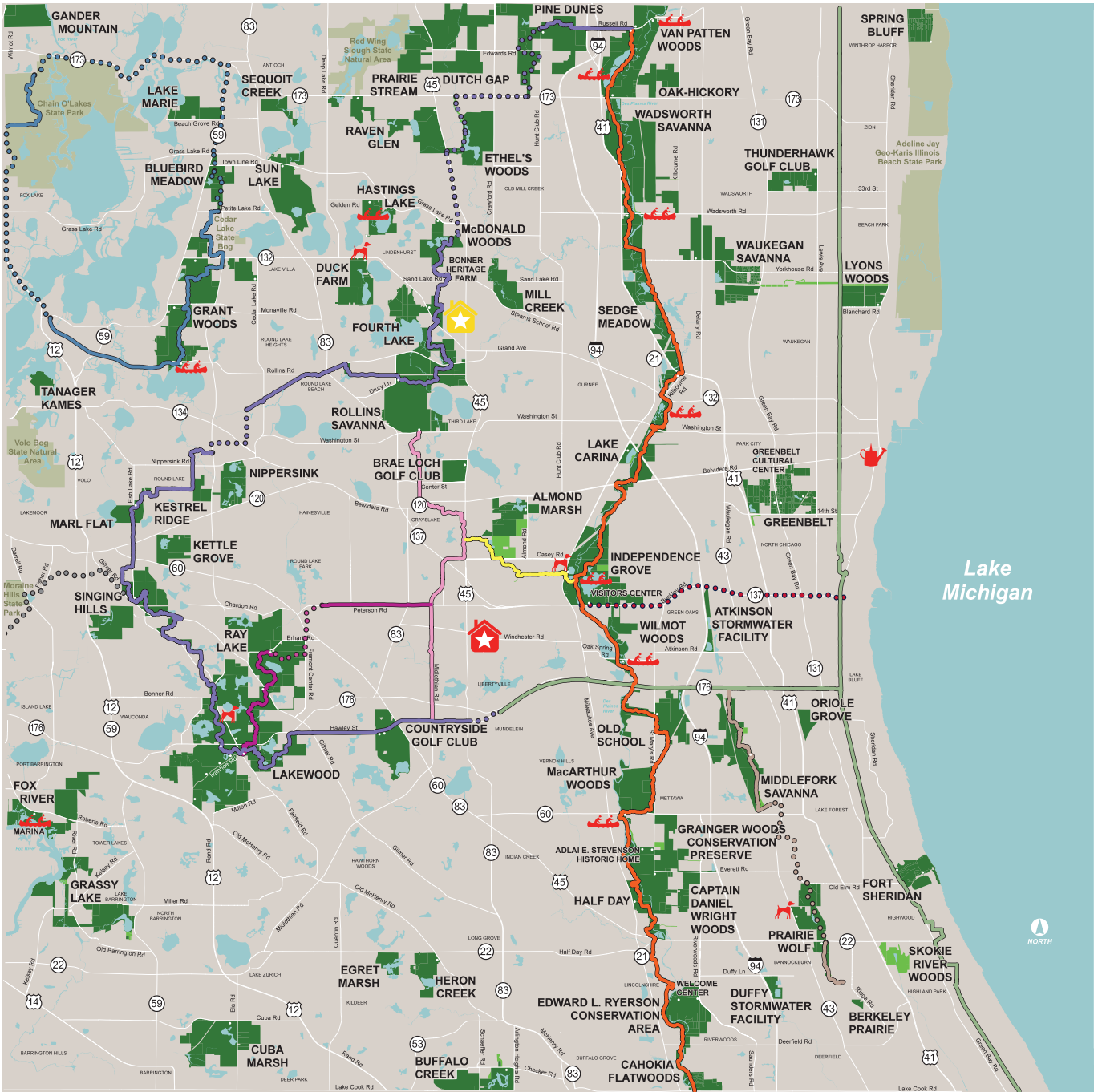

CHART LEGEND

*When snow cover is adequate, be aware that hikers, skiers and/or horses share some of these trails with snowmobiles.

Note: 4 inches of snow required for skiers at Ryerson Woods.

1 Dogs, horses and other pets prohibited at these preserves.

2 Snowmobiles between Wadsworth Road and Russell Road only.

3 Horses Lakewood and Singing Hills sections only.

Note: Permits required for picnic shelters, dog parks, model airplane field and equestrians. Call for details.

OTHER AREAS – More than 7,300 acres

Some of these other areas are open to the public (except farmlands and select other sites as posted). However, facilities are not available and parking must comply with local traffic regulations.

For general information or assistance, call or visit our General Offices in Libertyville, 847-367-6640, weekdays from 8 am–4:30 pm, or our Operations and Public Safety Facility in Lake Villa, 847-968-3411, weekdays from 6:30 am–3 pm.

For emergencies, call 911. For nonemergency public safety issues, call 847-549-5200 and ask to speak with a Ranger.

Most forest preserves are open from 6:30 am–sunset, daily. If a preserve gate is open before 6:30 am, the preserve is considered open for use. Special hours apply at the Dunn Museum, golf courses, dog parks, Ryerson Woods, Greenbelt Cultural Center, Independence Grove and the Fox River marina.
