- **6.** Though regular preserve hours are 6:30 am—sunset, the illuminated trails and adjacent parking lots will remain **open after sunset until 9 pm daily from Sunday, November 1, 2020, through Sunday, March 14, 2021: LCFPD.org/lighted-trails-for-evening-hikes**
- **7.** The preserve and nearby Old School Road each got their name from the now-defunct **Bradley School**, which stood near the preserve's southeast corner: <u>LCFPD.org/old-school</u>
- **8. Shelter E:** LCFPD.org/equestrian-trails
- 9. Fungi or mushrooms.
- 10. Twelve acres and 16 feet maximum depth: LCFPD.org/fishing/old-school-lake
- **11. False.** The Old School hill is open 6:30 am–sunset daily when conditions allow for sledding. To access the sled hill, follow the roadway until you reach the parking area on your right signed for sledding and skating: LCFPD.org/sledding
